3. **Update from the Office of the Dean**  
C. Alcena (on behalf of Liza Nassim) reported on the following:
  - The Office of the Dean of Students is wrapping up a successful year delivering student life programming to our students.
  - CCR: Since September 2015, we've expanded the Woodsworth College Co-Curricular Record to include the Alumni Student Mentorship Program Mentees, Academic Bridging Mentorship Program Mentors, as well as committee members from several WCSA committees (including: Off-Campus Committee, Social Committee, Public Relations Committee & 'Are You Woodsworthy?' Leadership Conference Committee).
  - Community Outreach: This past February, we successfully recruited, organized and trained a team of twelve Woodsworth students to participate in CCP's Alternative Reading Week.
  - Career Month: We developed a month-long campaign (Career Month @ Woodsworth) to promote career events, workshops, advising hours, and resources to all Woodsworth students.
  - DiversiTea: Our office developed and delivered three sessions in a workshop series entitled "DiversiTea." DiversiTea is a new initiative open to all U of T students, faculty and staff. This series of hour-long moderated panel discussions covers a variety of diversity and equity related issues including: There's Unity in Equity, Consent, Being an Ally, and Being Indigenous on Campus.
  - Leadership: We recently wrapped up our winter semester offering of the Learning to Lead Program at Woodsworth College, in collaboration with the Office of Student Life. Fourteen Woodsworth students participated in the program (Becoming Woodsworthy) within the Fall

semester, and twenty-five in the Winter. This 6-week series assists students with developing leadership skills, getting involved, and finding opportunities for self-growth through leadership.

- E-Mentorship: Great news - we have been approved from step forward for 2 more years of our E-Mentorship program, with additional funds for developing on line resources. Some of you will remember our on line enhancements this past year, we are excited to continue to build this very worthwhile program. We are currently seeking mentors and have 86 who have applied so far, including mentors from last year and mentees as well.
- First-Year Group Mentorship: Twelve groups are actively connecting with their students, and meeting on-campus a minimum of three times per semester. Our office has been extremely impressed with the activities delivered by each pair of mentors, which has included bringing in guest speakers and organizing a trip to the ROM.
- Grad Expo with Innis College Student Life: This consisted of a half-day of programming in November which fifty-eight students attended. We provided students with information about graduate programs, life after graduation, and career resources, and it featured sessions that incorporated the Registrar's Office, Career Centre, School of Graduate Studies, Alumni & Advancement, and the Financial Aid Office.
- Student Involvement Appreciation Reception Committee at Woodsworth College: We are currently in the process of organizing a reception held at the end of each academic year, to recognize all students currently engaged with College activities.
- WCSA/WOLF: Once again, our office assisted WCSA with running their elections, designating Christina as their Chief Returning Officer. She was responsible for supervising, organizing, and overseeing all candidate nominations and campaigns, as well as set up and overseeing the voting system through the Office of Student Life voting system. Christina is also a member of the Orientation Management Committee and is currently working closely with the Orientation Coordinators and WOLF Coordinators to help them plan, organize, and present Woodsworth Orientation 2016.
- Residence Updates: Residence summer applications are open. Fall winter applications for returners have closed, and offers were out. Some students are on the wait list if spaces become available. We are remaining with our 80 % first year and 20 percent first year as we see what our numbers look like.

#### 4. **Acting Principal's Report – Carol Chin**

C. Chin reported on the following:

- Announcements – congratulatory!
  - Silvia Cocolo received the Dean's Outstanding Staff Award for Student Life
  - Kerry Taylor (WDW One; Academic Bridging Bridging) was promoted to Sessional Lecturer II
  - Liza Nassim's STEP Forward funding for online orientation and enhancement of orientation activities – renewed for 2 years
- Recent events:
  - Annual awards dinner was held on Feb. 4 and was a successful event with many students honoured for their academic achievements.
  - Many of us attended 2 receptions for mentorship: U of T's Mentor Recognition event at the Design Exchange on Feb 10 with President Meric Gertler in attendance. The Alumni-Students Mentorship Program Closing Reception took place on March 8<sup>th</sup> at the Munk School for Global Affairs.
  - A dinner for MasterCard Foundation Scholars was held on February 8<sup>th</sup>. C. Chin attended.
  - The Alumni Association held a successful cafe in February on the topic of the Paleo Diet with naturopath Dr. Marc Bubbs.
  - Truth and Reconciliation Commission and the Universities response to it has been in the news.
    - Paul Gries spoke to the FAS response to this and Matt Light informed council that the Centre for Criminology & Sociolegal Studies is hoping to introduce a course on aboriginal people in the justice system

- Space planning:
    - Short term plans: The computer lab is to be moved to room 116 and Room 107 is to become a leaning centre. Roger Bulgin commented that the new computer lab will have 50% less computers, which is based on demand.
    - Long-term planning: The in fill project is ongoing and moving along very slowly
  - Upcoming events:
    - Sefton-Williams Lecture Thurs March 31: Speaker: Dr. David Weil (Administrator, Wage and Hour Division, U.S. Dept. of Labor): *The Fissured Workplace: Is there still a Role for Labour Policy in the new World of Work?* Sefton Williams award for contributions to industrial relations to be presented to Olivia Chow.
    - Edwards lecture, April 8: speaker: Marie Gottschalk, Professor at the University of Pennsylvania. Topic: *Are we there yet? The future of penal reform and the carceral state in the US.*
    - Convocation: June 10. The honorary degree recipient will be James Bartleman, Canadian diplomat and the 27th Lieutenant Governor of Ontario.
5. **Report of the Vice-Principal – Brock MacDonald**  
 B. MacDonald reported on the following:
- A new popular culture course was approved by FAS, we will recruit students and this will be a free standing Woodsworth course, there will be student interest, but will have to get the word out about the course
  - Program development: regarding a possible business course, discussion are ongoing, and we remain strongly committed
  - Academic Writing centre: numbers are better, students are using the same number of appointments and unused appointments has decreased. A factor might be the number of online appointments that are offered. A discussion ensued as to different models of writing centre appointments and drop in programs

7. **Update on WDW One – Beth Fischer**
- The Order & Disorder stream of WDW One is drawing to a close. We began with 70 students this year and so far have only lost two. This term we have had a field trip to the ROM to visit the First Nations exhibit as part of our discussions about law, technology, and changing social orders. We have also had a series of co-curriculars about choosing Subject POSTs. We had representatives from 12 different academic programs meet with the students, as well as WDW One alumni to discuss majors from the perspective of upper-year students. A number of WW faculty and staff took part in these sessions, including Carol Chin, Matthew Light, and Anne Marie Blackett.
  - Applications for the 2016-2017 school year are beginning to roll in.
  - The first cohort of WDW One students will be graduating this spring. We therefore now have the opportunity to study the progress of WDW One students throughout their time at U of T. Cheryl Shook and I are looking forward to gathering data on this cohort and their successors to learn more about the long-term impact of the program on our students.
8. **Update, Academic Bridging Program – Theresa Moritz (on behalf of Tom Socknat)**
- Starting next academic year, the winter session Bridging courses would change in length. They will run for the regular January through April term, with classes meeting twice a week in three-hour sessions, and the final examination held during the regular examination period.

**Appendix A:**

Admissions to the Academic Bridging Program were up this year. A new communications strategy was initiated which is more web based. The printed calendar was replaced with a flyer, directing individuals to the detailed information and application on the website.

The application process is more streamlined and the enhanced system allows us to follow-up with individuals who have initiated an online application. In addition, a new course was launched this year--Environmental Studies. This course has proven to be very popular.

**Appendix B:**

WDW FAS admissions were up slightly (54 students) over last year despite the fact that FAS admissions Faculty-wide were significantly over target. We were cushioned from this overage by the fact that we did not accept all of our first choice admits in May (a first) and by raising the Commerce average for first choice WDW to 91.8%.

Summer Visiting Numbers are down significantly. We surmise that more students are choosing to do online courses rather than come to the University of Toronto campus for summer courses.

Admissions into the FAS via the Diploma to Degree Program remains fairly consistent. Interest from George Brown students is increasing.

**Appendix C & Appendix D:**

Nov. 1 count numbers up overall – especially FT degree. One reason for this increase is likely that students could be in a 3.0 load (considered full-time) and pay tuition on a “per course” basis.

The colleges agree to take a certain percentage of the Faculty incoming class. Woodsworth’s target is 16% of the incoming 101 and 105 population—other colleges take a greater proportion (3 take 18%). Woodsworth maintains a higher overall enrolment count because we admit students from other pathways.

The show rates for AB full-time admissions continues to be high. We are close to the Faculty show rates for 101s and 105s.
