In partnership with the University Provost and the Faculty of Arts & Science, the Pre-University program was relaunched as the **Millie Rotman Shime Academic Bridging Program** in 2000 as a for credit program. Manny Rotman received his bachelor's degree from Woodsworth College in 1985 at age 76.
